Alpine Ski Nova Scotia Treasurers Report 2019-2020

Alpine Ski NS ended the year in good financial shape with a surplus of \$24,120.67. Notable financial events that occurred this year are:

- Established an official financial policy document
- Creation of a finance sub-committee
- Updated our equipment funds policy to include both general equipment purchases and B-net purchases.
 - \$40,750 new equipment fund established \$30,000 general and \$10,750 internally restricted for B- Net purchases
 - o \$1,837.70 withdrawn from general equipment funds for purchase of event tent
 - \$2,320 added to internally restricted fund for B-Net Purchases
 - o \$5,000 committed to purchases B-Net for the 2020-2021 season
 - Equipment fund ending the year \$41,232.30; \$13,070 is internally restricted for B-net purchases
- Increased revenue from partner organizations related to share of ED salary.
- Utilization of Online banking and electronic transfers to simplify banking
- Amalgamation of numerous GICs to simplify administration

High Performance Administrative Director Report 2019-20 Season

It was a disappointing and abrupt end to the 2020 ski race season for our Ski NS members especially our High Performance athletes as National level races were cancelled due to the pandemic. Ski NS had athletes in the U14, U16 and FIS age groups who, after a great season, were ready to lay down top results at a variety of National level races.

After three years as a Ski NS Board Member, I have resigned from my volunteer role as the High Performance Administrative Director. Many thanks to the Ski Nova Scotia Board of Directors for their hard work. Special thanks to our Executive Director, Andrew Hayes, the HPP Committee, as well as all our Ski NS Members.

Below are some of the tasks I contributed to in the 2019-20 ski race season:

- Documents were improved/created for Ski NS Board approval for the following items:
 - AAA documents (Ski NS requested greater transparency and accountability with selection criteria for AAA team selection & AAA policies. Ski NS's recommendations to Selection Criteria Policies are to be reviewed at the next AAA Planning Meeting/AGM whereas recommendations made on the structure and bylaws of the AAA were declined).
 - U16 Nationals Team Selection Criteria
 - U16 Nationals Team Manager/Chaperone Document following AAA policy
 - Ski NS HPP Technical Director Position Proposal (declined/altered proposal and was not carried out by Ski NS in the 2019/20 season).
- Fitness testing (which incl. Functional Movement Screenings) was organized (for the top Ski NS U16 & all FIS racers) in December 2019 and, due to the Province's state of emergency, are TBD for May 2020.
- Leading High Performance Pathway Committee meetings
- Advocacy for our Ski Nova Scotia athletes at the Ski NS & AAA Committee level
- Team Manager Role & Chaperone Role for the U16 Nationals and the U16 Easterns
- Provided assistance with documentation/coordination for the Next Gen SX ID camp at Sunshine which was cancelled shortly thereafter.

1.1 CONTRIBUTORS TO TOP RESULTS?

This is our third year without a Technical Director leading our High Performance Pathway. It is my belief that results from our top athletes stem primarily from the fundamentals and guidance of our home clubs, the individual athletes commitment to multiple sports, as well as year-round strength & conditioning programs. The athletes who are excelling are also meeting the recommendations for pre-season on-snow training days as presented by Alpine Canada. Our top athletes attended Ski NS club pre-season camps as well as camps offered elsewhere internationally or with other inclusive clubs elsewhere in Canada.

2.0 2020 U16 Nationals Team Selection

The selection for the 2020 U16 Nationals was based on National Points and the cut-off date was after the Crabbe Race approximately five weeks before Nationals. The HPP drafted the Team Selection Criteria and was submitted to the Ski NS Board for approval. The board strived to fill all available quota with consideration to the National Points Standings. Many experienced coaches expressed their dislike for using National Points as the main objective data for team selection as it is felt it does not provide an accurate standings of each athlete in the current season. It has been recommended that Ski Nova Scotia Board of Directors revisit their selection process to place greater value on current season results by using a World Cup Points system or similar method. No fundraising was organized but we did have a generous offer by Dave Pace of Overhead Doors of Nova Scotia Ltd. to help offset the costs of team gear. No pre-season camps were organized. Athletes shared the coaching expenses.

3.0 EVOLVING THE SKI NS HIGH PERFORMANCE PATHWAY

Andrew Hayes and I both sat down with the Canadian Sport Center Atlantic & Sport Nova Scotia in the Spring of 2019 to discuss the best plan moving forward for a select Ski NS High Performance Team. Based on this exchange with our program's funders the following was proposed to the Ski NS Board of Directors. Efforts were made to have this adopted for this past season were not successful. The recommendations are now being recommended for the 2020-21 season-I hope that Ski Nova Scotia take steps to evolve the HPP program as recommended by October of 2020 to include the following:

SKI NOVA SCOTIA HIGH PERFORMANCE PATHWAY PROGRAM:

-A Performance Team: Top seven U16 & and Ski NS FIS Racers -A Development Team: Any self-declared competitive racer U12+

YEAR 2020/21 Ski NS Performance Team: WHO?

• The top seven and top seven female U16 Ski NS athletes based on National Points AND all Ski NS FIS-card holders.

Ski Nova Scotia will only select U16 Alpine Ski Racers for the Canada Winter Games Team and no U14/U18 athletes will be selected. Please note that CWGs replaces U16 Nationals in a CWGs year. Ontario, Quebec, British Columbia & Alberta may only send U16s. According to the CWG Technical Package in years past, the smaller, less competitive regions may send up to two U18s and may apply for an exemption for U14s to be selected.

HOW?

The U16 Performance Team will be selected by XX/XX/XXX (end of current Ski Race Season?) in order to train as a team through the summer & fall for the Ski NS Team for U16 Nationals or the Canada Winter Games. This should allow sufficient time to plan and train. Please note that U16 Nationals occurs every year except for a Canada Games Year and the Canada Winter Games are held every four years, 2023, 2027, etc...The final team selection for U16 Nationals (5 male + 5 female) or CWGs (7 male + 7 female) will follow Ski NS Team Selection Criteria for that particular season.

WHAT?

- O Top U16 SNS Athletes and SNS FIS racers will be invited to a user-pay **Ski** NS U16/FIS Pre-Season Training Camp. The U16 athletes will be chosen based on their cumulative ACA National Points at the end of the previous season. It was recommended that we hire an Alpine Canada Coach Development Officer to lead a free-ski/technical free ski camp (as well as mentor Ski NS Coaches.. It was also recommended that Ski NS apply for a grant to help cover the costs of the camp. The camp is to be run as a not-for-profit camp which should not exceed 200\$/day plus flights. The camp dates must not conflict with club-based training camps.
- Performance Team athletes are expected to be committed to a year-round strength & conditioning program and are expected to participate in two yearly Fitness Tests which follow Alpine Canada's Fitness Testing Protocol.
- Performance Team athletes are expected to race in all four Alpine Events if they wish to be considered for National level events where all four Alpine Events are part of the event.
- Performance Team athletes are expected to strive to meet the Alpine Canada pre-season on-snow recommendations.
- Ski NS will always respect that education commitments always come first and will cooperate wherever possible to support Ski NS athletes.
- <u>YEAR 2020/21 Development Group</u>: Ski NS hold Provincial Development Workshop yearly in the Autumn (a hike, info sessions, get together) and during Season at Ski NS Races (info session where we discuss the HP Pathway). Anyone can attend who is interested in competitive Alpine Ski Racing

FUNDING

<u>CSCA Grants</u> Mike Hudson & Evan McGinnis recommended Ski NS apply for a
 Project Grant to offset the costs of sending Ski NS coaching staff for development
 opportunity to the Pre-season camp which may be led by an ACA Learner Facilitator
 or by attending Nationals or CWGs. Grants which are used to develop coaches will
 lower the user-pay fee of athletes to attend camp/race. **

- <u>PSO Funding</u> through the Support for Sport could be used to subsidize the cost of coaching fees at Nationals/CWGs thereby supporting Coach Development and cutting costs for athletes participating in this National Level events. The approximate breakdown for Ski NS High Performance (Excellence) funding is as follows:
 - o 2018/2019 \$7,500
 - 2019/2020 \$4,750, *\$7500 roughly for this year with surplus
 - o 2020/2021 \$2000
 - o 2021/2021 \$2000

*Please Note: 2019/20 Our Executive Director also reports that there is currently a surplus of \$2,432.11 sitting in the Ski NS HPP account which is unspent from previous years.

We could also use funding as an honorarium for a coach taking on the Technical Director role. But as Maurice indicated, this honorarium would not compensate a TD fairly.

**Please note: The CSCA does not recommend giving funds to an athlete directly-instead they recommend supporting a program that will benefit the coaching development and the up and coming athletes on a whole.

4.0 HIRING A TECHNICAL DIRECTOR FOR SKI NS

In order to better serve our competitive racers, Ski NS needs to get serious about hiring a Technical Director and compensating this position with a fair salary. Our funding, as well as the development of our athletes & coaches, is dependent upon how well we set up and run our High Performance Pathway. Hiring a TD is pivotal for this to be successful.

The following proposal for a Technical Director was proposed in 2019 by the HPP Committee to the Ski NS Board of Directors. The HPP Pre-Season Camp which was recommended as the main program component by the CSCA to the HPP Performance Team is not included below because the Ski NS Board could not agree on the proposal in a timely manner for the 2019-20 season. The following proposal was initially declined due to board members voting against the High Performance Technical Director having On-snow components with members of the HPP Performance Team. The Ski NS Board of Directors then removed the On-Snow components of the TD role then stretched the \$5000 honorarium from a six month to an 18 month position (\$278/month). Because Ski NS missed the opportunity to run a HPP Pre-Season camp in the 2019-20 season, running the camp should be added to the list of TD Roles and Responsibilities here:

General Roles & Responsibilities

The Successful candidate is someone who is in good standing with the Canadian Ski Coaches Federation (CSCF) and is up-to-date with their RCMP Criminal Background Check, Vulnerable Sector Check and the NS Child Abuse Registry Checks. The Interim Technical Director will be expected to carry out the following tasks:

 Attend monthly HPP Committee Meetings & AAA Committee Meetings either in person or by conference call;

- Application for the 2020 U16 Nationals Coaching Staff is preferred but is not a
 prerequisite. Support in the administrative planning & logistics for the U16 Nationals
 Team is required leading up until the event;
- Work together with the HPP Administrative Director and the Ski NS HPP Committee
 to define & develop the Ski NS High Performance Pathway for a Performance Team
 (Top U16 & FIS Athletes) and a Development Team (U12+);
- Attend races at Ben Eoin SX/SL, WSRC Roland Brunner and Martock SL/SX;
- Hold parent information sessions for Ski NS Members on the High Performance Pathway at the Ben Eoin SX & SL Race, the Roland Brunner Race & the Martock Race:
- Coordinate & attend Interclub training for U16 National Team and FIS racers on a Wednesday evening at Martock and/or a Friday at Wentworth;
- Advocate for Ski NS Racers for the AAA Team Selection at U14 Can Ams, U16
 Eastern Finals, Whistler Cup and FIS Nationals (apply for one or more of these coaching positions);
- Organize and attend Fitness Testing in May of 2020, (save and distribute results);
- Coordinate applications for any FIS eligible Ski NS racers to attend Alpine Canada National Development Camps (April/May);
- Participate in the Canadian Sport Centre Atlantic Coach Mentorship Program
- Meet with CSCA/Sport Nova Scotia Representatives as needed on High Performance Proposals, attend any HP CSCA workshops for PSO TDs;
- Apply to the CSCA Sport Science Program on behalf of Ski NS and Ski NS High Performance Athletes
- Attend the Ski NS AGM & provide a thorough AGM report with recommendations;
- Correspond regularly with Ski NS coaches for constructive feedback.
- (Should be edited to add: Run the U16/FIS Invitational Pre-Season Training Camp as recommended by the CSCA)

Compensation

The Interim Technical Director will be paid \$5000 for this six-month 18 month position.

5.0 Recommendations for the 2020-21 Ski Race Season

5.1 Technical Director

Ski NS reconsider the edits to the HPP Technical Director to include the Pre-Season HPP Camp as well as a more fair honorarium which, in my opinion, is an insufficient amount of funds for the amount of work a TD will take on especially without the assistance of an Administrative Director. Ski NS should set the goal of hiring a TD by September 2020.

5.2 High Performance Pathway

Ski NS adopt the recommended changes to the Ski NS HPP Program immediately in order to allow enough time to give athletes an optimal preparation for the new season.

5.3 AAA

Ski NS communicate with the AAA Committee in order to discuss improved policies for:

5.31 AAA Team Athlete Selection
 What is the policy on filling quota? Who decides whether quota is filled or not?
 Coaches should be included in the selection process.

5.32 AAA Team Coach Selection

AAA should avoid hiring Parent-Coaches (unless a parent is actively coaching a group that season) who work for no salary. This undermines coaches who work hard for their certification and takes away a coaching development opportunity from our region. PSOs should consider subsidizing coaching expenses at National level events in order to avoid this scenario.

• 5.33 AAA Calendar

Ski NS advocate for Ski NS athletes by supporting a AAA race calendar which enables an optimal race:training ratio for optimal athlete development. https://ltad.alpinecanada.org/uploads/documents/v3 SX Focus Matrix en .pdf

5.4 Recommendations for all Future Ski NS National Race events

5.41 Athlete Selection Ski NS revisit Selection Criteria to be more than just using Alpine National Points which includes Ski Cross results.

• 5.42 Athlete Participation Costs at National Level Events Ski NS should set a hard limit for athlete costs for attending National level events (CWG and U16 Nationals and FIS Nationals). For instance athletes attending U16 Nationals pay \$1500 plus flight and Ski NS High Performance picks up the remainder of the costs. An alternative would be that Ski NS covers all coaching fees and expenses as well as athletes race fees then the athletes only pay their own expenses (accommodations, food, etc...). This way we as a PSO are supporting Coach Development and providing a High Performance coaching opportunity where coaches can give back to Ski NS athletes. We also keep the athletes expenses down by financing coach development and paying their race fees as they represent our Province.

• 5.43 Athlete Travel

U16 Athletes who are selected for a Ski NS team must be prepared to travel into a particular airport by a particular time. Anyone not complying will have to arrange alternative travel plans at their own expense while sharing the team itinerary expenses. No exceptions.

• 5.44 Safe Sport Policy

Ski Nova Scotia should create a Safe Sport policy which specifically addresses National Level events. For instance striving for coaching gender representation or establishing policy on alternate chaperoning. Establishing policies on coaches and athletes accommodations (how many athletes per room, per bed?).

5.45 Ski NS Team Manager

Ski NS establish roles and responsibilities for Team NS Manager (and Chaperone if needed) for all Team NS National events (U16 Nationals and Canada Winter Games) as well as a policy for compensation for this/these roles. Managing the logistics for Team NS for a National Level event is a lot of work. Our Executive Director is running

three different PSOs who often have National events at the same time as Alpine-it is not fair nor is it practical to leave the entire manager role to them. AAA has a policy on a Manager/Chaperone role. For instance each athlete pays an administrative fee (\$50/athlete) towards the Manager. A chaperone who attends the event (and in some cases cooks for the entire team) does not pay for accommodations/food.

5.46 Team Nova Scotia Gear

Team NS could consider creating Team Ski Nova Scotia Team Gear every four years beginning in a Canada Games Year. Athletes who qualify for a National event may order as needed. Athletes would receive a Ski Nova Scotia Crest (paid for by Ski NS) with the Event Name and Year (ie 2020 U14 Can Ams or 2019 Canada Winter Games) each time they make a team to have sewn on their jacket (Ellen Coady's idea). The reasons behind this is in an effort to keep down costs and not be wasteful with multiple jackets. Athletes who have made both Nationals and CWGs and all Can Ams opportunities will have spent \$1000-1200 on team gear, some items of which are doubled. If organised in advance it may give Ski NS time to organize sponsors to offset costs. It is do-able but not without stress to order team gear with short notice.

2019 - 2020 CADS-NS Report

For the 2019-2020 season, CADS-NS had 97 registered members, 31 registered Coaches/Instructors and 9 registered Volunteers.

BEST Presidents Report – 2019/2020

Enrolment

The Ben Eoin Ski Team increased its enrolment this year. We had a lot of interest in our one day program and most of the increase was at or below the U12 level.

- U16 Recreational Card: 3 (increase 2)
- U14 National Card: 1 racers (decrease 2)
- U14 Recreational Card: 3 racers (no change)
- U12 Recreational Card: 6 racers (no change)
- U6/U8/U10 Recreational Card: 19 racers (decrease 1)
- Masters and University: 0 (no change)
- General Members, Coaches: 10 (no change)

Administration

- The BEST executive and board continue to implement systems and structures to manage the club, coaching and communication
- Tyler Kaupp stayed on as Club President and Bob Pelley was active once again in his new role of Past President. All of the other board member and executive remained the same. However, we added Veronika Brezski as the U18 representative and Murdock MacDonald as the U10 representative.
- Ski Ben Eoin continues to be an excellent partner and host to BEST throughout the year providing lane space, and facility access. Darcy MacDonald, who replaced Rob Carmichael as our contact, was great to work with and was open to many of the ideas brought forward by the Ben Eoin Ski Team
- BEST continues to have conversations about building its website to help with registration and the flow of information between parents, coaches and board members.
- The executive and volunteers of the BEST consist of a great group of people who are engaged, motivated and optimistic about the future of ski racing at Ben Eoin. The executive met several times throughout the summer and fall of 2019 to plan for the 2020 season. We understand the Ski Cross Race is a lot of work which requires a ton of planning...

Supporting Growth

- The team continues to evaluate the need and options for a "Team Space"
- The BEST purchased a dozen new radios and continues to rent several more for the BEST race weekend.
- BEST was once again generously supported through major sponsorship by Ski Ben Eoin,
 Wilson Home Hardware, Don Hatchers Truck Repair, JJ Barrington Auto Body,
 Louisbourg Seafoods and Seaside High Speed Internet.
- BEST, in conjunction Ski Ben Eoin, is once again looking into applying for the Ski Racing Safety Grant through the Nik Zoricic Foundation to assist in the procurement of new safety netting. BEST is looking at purchasing at least 20 Barry Poles and possibly more roles of B-Netting.

Pre-Season

- Dryland Training was once again offered to all athletes starting in October
- We had a couple racers visit Sunday River before the season began

Calendar and Training

- Although we are a small team, BEST was represented at almost all of the races on the AAA this this year
- Unfortunately due to its early placement in the Schedule and our late start to the season, the Poley Race was not attended by our racers. Many of our parents were unable to make it to the Martock race as well as it was back to back with our race. The younger athletes and their parents were tired after the four day BEST race and the volunteering that goes along with that.
- Training was well attended by all athletes with the majority of the racers registered for the Saturday and Sunday training. We also had several U14+ and a couple U12 racers registered for the High Performance Program with Roger Hardy as coach.
- There were also some athletes enrolled in the one-day program, which we added in previous years to help encourage enrolment
- The programs were well run with many BEST athletes finishing in Top 5 positions throughout the race calendar.
- We had two athletes U16 athletes very close to making it to Nationals.

- We also had three athletes place very well at the PEI race, all of them finishing first or second in all of their races.
- BEST tried a new coaching strategy this year in which we divided the younger groups based on Snowstars level. This, for the most part, proved very beneficial to the younger racers and also the coaches. The racers of similar skill level were able to learn faster and concentrate on skills as a group as opposed to having several different skill levels with the same coach. This also benefited the coaches, in that, they could focus on one lesson plan for their entire group instead of trying to accommodate several different skill sets in one lesson.
- Currently, we are looking at the one-day program and also the registration cost of the team. We found with the one-day program, although it helped increase enrollment, it is becoming more difficult to maintain with the small number of coaches available. We are also considering increasing our registration fees as we found some parents were inquiring about the ski team because it offered a much more cost effective option when compared to the ski school. We are trying to avoid this and continue to focus on those athletes that want to "ski race" not just learn "how to ski"

Coaching

- Bettina Callary was back this year after her of sabbatical in Australia with her family.
- Roger Hardy continued to coach the U14+ athletes as well as the High Performance Program. He was helped by Aaron Wilson and Shane Kaiser.
- Kevin Elworthy and Stefanie Elworthy continued to coach the U12 athletes with Emily Pelley helping out on a part-time basis.
- Andrew Giorno was a great addition to the coaching staff this year. His energy and passion for the sport was perfect for the U10/U8 group he coached.
- Ryan Dunphy was also added this year as a new coach and helped us out with the U8's and lower level Snowstars kids. He was helped by Katja Seufert on occasion when numbers were high or if Ryan was unable to attend.
- The coaches worked with the athletes on snow as well as dryland training sessions which included fitness testing, athlete goals and racing plans.
- We continue to try and get more of our parents involved in taking some officials courses to help with our race weekend. We have two individuals within our organization with level 3 official's courses.

BEST Race

- The Jerry Giorno Memorial Cup was held this year on the Feb 8th weekend.
- We added a Slalom event this year which ran on the Sunday
- There were two Ski Cross training days, Thursday and Friday, with the race being held on Saturday. The codexed Slalom event was held on Sunday
- BEST felt it was important to add the Slalom event to add more variety to the weekend and garner more interest from older athletes.
- The race was very successful, in that, estimates show around 130-140 racers from across the AAA were in attendance. By far our biggest race in the history of the Jerry Giorno Memorial Cup.
- On Friday afternoon, we had a scheduled fireside event planned for a conversation with Shane Somers and a couple of other athletes who competed nationally, but unfortunately due to bad weather, this was cancelled.
- BEST is always striving to improve year to year and we have identified some things that
 we are working to improve for next year. Many of the parents, coaches and board
 members have been doing the ski cross for several years now and each year we try and
 build on the previous year's successes and improve on the shortcomings.
- Timing proved to be an issue again and we are working on some solutions over the summer months. We have had initial discussions with Wentworth about a new timing system, but we are unsure of our direction with that thus far. With only 4 national card holders it's difficult to say whether an investment in a new timing software is practical.
- Scheduling of the Ski Cross event also continues to evolve. We are looking at adjusting the schedule and *potentially* running the time trials at the end of the training day Friday instead of the morning of the race. This would allow for more time on the Race Day which always seems to take up full day in itself.
- The BEST executive continues to explore Ski Cross and is focused on developing and improving the course year to year. Our long-term goal would be to have a product that gains National attention on the Ski Cross Stage.

2020 MSRC President's Report

Enrolment

This year Martock Ski Race Club enrolled 67 athletes at the U10 level, 36 at U12 and 23 at U14, 16 at U16, 5 at U18, 8 Masters, and 9 Freestyle athletes. The chart below shows our registered athletes over the last 6 seasons and demonstrates growth overall, and good retention. Most notable is more than 50% growth over this timeframe.

Administration

Administrative duties for the club are demanding, particularly in the area of financial administration. The Executive made a concerted effort this season to update athlete accounts, and hired a bookkeeper rather than rely on a volunteer to complete the tasks of bill payment, account reconciliation, and financial reporting. The effort is ongoing, but will ultimately allow for better long-term planning for the club.

Registration & Communication

MSRC is using Goalline to administer registration, and to serve as the backbone for our website. It has allowed us to consolidate our communication in one location, and to have multiple executive and coaches share the communication duties. This year we also used this method for member registration for pre-season camps and race events, which was effective in reducing our systems to one platform, and in collecting fees in advance.

We also maintain a social media presence on Facebook and Instagram, but limit it to primarily sharing event photos and info for the events open to the public.

Support from Ski Martock

Ski Martock continues to be a valued partner for the club. They provide training space and support our fundraising efforts with space to host the Ski Swap and BBQ's during the season. Ski Martock has also supported the U10 / U12 race and ski cross by providing terrain and participating in the Nomad pass program along with other Atlantic ski resorts. Freestyle training and events also benefit from an

excellent terrain park and venue to host comps. Ski Martock plays an active role in participating in our planning meeting and welcoming visiting coaches and athletes to our race.

Programs

As in previous years, MSRC athletes participated in dryland training sessions held weekly in Wolfville, Halifax, and Windsor during the fall of the year. Athletes also attended two pre-season camps in Quebec during December. We have seen increased participation in the camps over previous years, with the only challenge being securing accommodations for the large numbers of athletes who participate. We also hosted a pre-season camp at Martock in December, allowing many athletes to gain a few days on snow before the start of the formal season.

Our on-snow training was held three days / week during January, February, and March until the season was cancelled due to the Covid-19 Pandemic.

MSRC was well represented at every AAA race and training camp.

Volunteers

MSRC continues to thrive on the efforts of its volunteer base. We actively recruit and mentor new parents and encourage them to pursue certification as officials. Our dedicated parent group demonstrates good support for the sport at away races by volunteering to officiate at events. Several parent volunteers took advantage of the Level 2 Officials course offered in the Fall, so we are well positioned to host races as well as fill various roles as visiting officials, including acting as TD and gaining race experience at National events.

Steve Earle and his company, Bauld Insurance was nominated for the Ski NS nomination as Sponsor of the year for both his efforts as volunteer Equipment Manager and for his financial support for the club to cover our insurance needs.

Coaching

MSRC hires approximately 35 coaches on a contractual basis each year, with an even split between parent coaches and former athletes who have returned to the club in a coaching role.

This year, we were fortunate to be able to add to our coaching excellence by hiring Remi Poirier who fulfilled the role of Head Coach with support from Kyle Endres (U10), Chris Shynal (U12) and Thom Oulton (U14). Remi was able to provide training and mentorship to several coaches which really strengthened the overall coaching level, especially for those working with the older athletes. Several coaches achieved their DL certification and Speed and SX modules over the season. We recognize the need to continue to invest in coaches by providing good mentorship opportunities, financial support for training, and flexibility with schedules as most balance coaching with school or work commitments elsewhere.

MSRC coaches provided support to athletes at the U16 National Championships this year. Remi Poirier was nominated as the Ski NS nominee for the Support for Sport Coach of the Year award because of his leadership during the Championships and throughout the season.

Recruiting coaches for the Freestyle program continues to be a limiting factor in the number of athletes we can support at the older age levels, however we were pleased to see Jordan Marczak recognized as the nominee for the Freestyle Support for Sport Coach of the Year Award.

Athlete Performance

MSRC athletes were able to turn their off-season and on snow efforts into podium results, and personal best performances all season long.

MSRC athletes Shane Sommer, Luke Ramsden, Jack Jurcina, Carmen Oulton, Salena MacDonald and coach Remi Poirier were selected to represent NS at the U16 National Championships. Shane achieved an 8th place result in the Giant Slalom race prior to the cancellation of the ski cross and slalom events.

Shane Sommer earned the Atlantic Cup award for top male racer in the U16 age category.

Although they were not able to attend due to the shortened season Shane Sommer and Carmen Oulton earned spots on the team for U16 Easterns, and Shane also earned a spot at Whistler Cup. Brendan Burke earned an invitation to the U16 Freestyle Championships.

MSRC would also like to acknowledge a strong showing for the provincial alpine and ski cross award recipients at every age level. With 19 different MSRC athletes taking home these honours, it is an indication that athletes are able to achieve success in multiple ski disciplines throughout their time as athletes.

At the provincial level, several MSRC athletes competed in the school races and took home podium finishes. In addition, Shane Sommer was nominated as the Jr Male Athlete of the Year for the Support for Sport Awards.

Contributions to Sport

MSRC's membership includes athletes and coaches from the Annapolis Valley, Halifax Regional Municipality, and South Shore. We strive to be a community-based organization, and we provided support to the NSSSF this year by loaning timing gear and knowledgeable officials to run the high school racing regional events.

WSRC's 2019/20 Season Report for Ski NS AGM

WSRC continues to be a vibrant, active and progressive member of the alpine ski racing in Nova Scotia. Here is a summary of notable aspects of the 2019/20 season.

Registration This year, WSRC opened registration in July, which was unprecedented for our club. U8 & U10 programs were full before the end of September and we had close to full program registration by the end of October. This was also unprecedented and gave our coaching staff the gift of time to plan the season. We continued to build on our 20% increase in membership last year and experienced an additional 7% increase in membership with 124 registered athletes. We also experienced a significant "Canada Games Effect" with a high attrition rate in the U16 category the season following the 2018 CWG.

Coaching All 20 WSRC Staff were Licensed for 2019-20:

- 1 PL Advanced Certified
- 2 PL Certified
- 1 DL Advanced Certified
- 5 DL Certified
- 3 DL Trained
- 1 EL Certified
- 7 EL Trained

WSRC had 3 Substitute Coaches:

- 1 PL Certified
- 2 EL Certified

Despite the shortened season, WSCR coaches still managed to accomplish a significant amount of Coach Education:

- 3 DL coaches passed their evaluations to become certified this season
- 1 DL coach completed CSIA Levels 1 & 2
- 11 Coaches Completed ACA Setting and Environments Module
- 10 Coaches completed the Level 2 Officials Module
- 4 Coaches completed the ACA SX Module

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<u>Officials</u> Five WSRC parents took the Level 2 officials' course in November. This year marked a new generation of race officials with the majority of member of our ROC for Brunner being their first year in their position. This is an area that needs ongoing nurturing to encourage parents to volunteer and develop their officiating skills and experience to replace the attrition of parents of children leaving the sport.

<u>Internal Governance / Policies</u> WSRC added a significant number of new policies to its club structure. A set of human resource management policies was created to bring WSRC up-to-date with current employment legislation and practices as an employer of coaches, improving transparency and accountability to how the club functions as an employer of coaches. A gap analysis of the CSA 2018 Risk Management Manual for Clubs was conducted. As a result of this, coach employment agreements and job descriptions were updated and a number of additional new policies were established.

External Linkages WSRC has, and will continue to, focus on its external linkages within the Atlantic Canada ski racing community. In December 2019, WSRC attended and made a presentation at the Ski Patrol Lodge Day in Wentworth including the presentation of a \$350 donation to the Ski Patrol. WSRC worked with BEST in the summer and fall to better understand BEST's Ski Cross event and this collaboration resulted in BEST developing an information sheet about their event which was shared with WSRC members at parent meetings and early in the season to improve communication about the event.

<u>Saturday Night Clubhouse Series</u> This year, to further enhance the utilization of the new clubhouse established last season, WSRC introduced the Saturday Night Clubhouse Series with different events each Saturday tailored to different age groups. This included chocolate bar bingo, board game night, and movie night. This club building initiative was extremely well received and supported by a broad range of parent volunteers.

<u>Fundraising</u> WSRC held several fundraising events: Third Annual Hopping Penguins Dance and Silent Auction, Aerobics First Twelve Hours of Wentworth Ski-a-thon and the Great Chilli Cook-off. WSRC developed a sponsorship package and obtained a new corporate sponsor Moffatt MacLellan Insurance who have committed to a five-year sponsorship. WSRC applied for and was successful in receiving a grant from Sport NS to assist with radio purchases.

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<u>Pre-Season Camp at MSA</u> The annual preseason camps run by Team Atlantic were offered in December at MSA. U14+ 5 day camp followed by a U10-U18 10 day camp. Participants included athletes from WSRC and all three NB clubs. The second camp had the largest attendance level in the 19 year history of the camp.

<u>Attendance at Away Races</u> To try to establish which races WSRC would attend a club this season, a preseason survey of U12 group was conducted which reflected the diversity of our club and it was apparent that there were no clear majority. The following summarizes WSRC attendance levels at away races:

WSRC-Hosted Races WSRC takes pride in hosting high quality events. The Slingshot was well attended despite the rainy weather. The bbq and special edition slingshot t-shirts continue to be a hit. Team Atlantic Slalom boasted beautiful conditions Headwall down and just one week before Brunner offered an excellent lead-up event. Conditions were maintained for Brunner. For Brunner, WSRC paid for hill operations to start the day early to move around equipment and for the lift to open early each day. One marker of success was that on the Sunday, we had everyone heading home before 3pm. The ROC has conducted a lessons learned to help with continuous improvement for next year. Bryne Cup and Club Championships were unfortunately cancelled due to the COVID19 pandemic. WSRC continued the practice we started last year of recognizing the top five finishers at all our race events. This year at Brunner we also implemented team awards.

Participation in the Team Atlantic event was significantly decreased this year, most likely due to Ski-NS not supporting the codexing of the event. The only visiting club to support the event was Poley who sent 6 athletes. The visiting coach from Poley provided positive feedback about the event. Also adversely affected by politics around codexing, was the Brunner Super G which had only 52 athletes attend compared with the 106 athletes who participated in the SG and/or SL.

This past season demonstrated a lack of support for the WSRC-hosted races by a number of parties. It is our sincere hope that moving forward, Ski-NS and AAA can make decisions that are athlete-focused and good for the development of the sport of alpine ski racing.

Another challenge encountered in hosting races is that it is becoming increasingly difficult to obtain volunteer ski patrol for Friday races. A solution that is being sought is to have a race parent become a ski patroller.

<u>Supporting FIS Athletes</u> New this year, WSRC has started initiatives to support FIS athletes because a) it is good for the sport to have the FIS athletes skiing with the younger kids, b) this is a form of financial relief to help support the FIS athletes, and c) as their race circuit is away, they miss a good portion of the season in WW. WSRC waived race fees for our hosted races. For WSRC FIS athletes, we did not require them to pay club coach expenses at AAA races. WSRC also provided flexibility to allow FIS athletes to register for the two-day program but attend any WW training days or camps as part of their base program fee.

<u>Clubhouse Capital Campaign</u> This was year two of our five year capital campaign and our BoD elected at the end of the season to repay the balance of the \$50K loan. The campaign was hugely successful due to excellent participation in fundraising efforts across the club as well as specific fundraising efforts of Dave & Christina Pace and Maurice Cramm.

End of Season Survey WSRC continues to receive positive feedback from its membership. Out of 63 respondents, over 95% view the program in a positive manner. Over 93% feel their children are getting the expected benefits of the program. Over 93% would recommend the program to a friend. There were some very positive comments and some constructive comments as well which WSRC uses as a basis for continuous improvement for the following season.

Next Up....Timing System Project The timing system owned by Ski-NS established at Ski Wentworth for the 2011 CWG is in need of repair and upgrading. WSRC is developing a project scope of work and budget and will provide a summary of this to Ski-NS before the end of June. It is our goal to reach agreement on the project and implement required repairs and recommended upgrades prior to the upcoming season.

In closing, on a personal note it has been an eye-opening experience to serve on a provincial sport organization board. I do believe that Ski-NS has room for improvement in the way it functions to be more effective. My participation was as the President of WSRC, and as such, I had a clear role to represent my club. I encourage the BoD members who are not one of the three sitting Presidents to take off their club hats and don their provincial hats when sitting at the board room table. A provincial perspective is what is needed to achieve sport development and athlete development in our province. Respect the Clubs' sovereignty. Each club has different focuses and strengths due to terrain, location and club culture. Respect these differences. Encourage collaboration. Build on the strengths of the clubs. There are many. Good luck.
